As you explore the exhibition, answer as many of the questions on these sheets as you can. All the solutions are there for you to find, you just have to look, listen and learn!




You are now exploring the times of the Maya Indians.








In this part of the exhibition you will see some of the ways chocolate is hand made or decorated.



The Cadbury World Chocolate Trail has been devised by teachers to provide a flexible resource to support Key Stage I class visits to this unique learning experience. Pre-visit preparation will not only increase the children's enjoyment of their visit, but will make the trail more meaningful.

Provision of clipboards for children completing the trail is advisable as there are few places for them to lean on to write or draw.

Encourage the class to look carefully around the exhibition above, below and at eye level for the answers.

Answers may be heard on the commentary so careful listening is also important.

Here are some suggestions for follow-up activities back at school:

Geography

• Highlight the area of Bournville before the Cadbury factory was built and then after.

• Locate the Cadbury factory on an ordnance survey map. Identify the transport links that make it a suitable location for the distribution of chocolate.

• Walk around the Bournville Village, looking at the buildings and houses that were built to support the workers of the Cadbury factory.

History

• Compare and contrast the style and type of houses - then and now. (This will tie in with the unit based on homes - past and present.)

- Identify similarities and differences between clothing worn by the workers then and now.
- Look at vehicles past and present especially related to the 'milkman and his float'. (This will tie in with the unit based on people who help us in the community.)
- Create a pictorial timeline showing:
 - history of the Cadbury factory
 - clothing worn
 - vehicles
 - houses

• Focus on the story of Samuel Pepys. (This will tie in with the unit on the Great Fire of London.)

Design and Technology/Art and Craft

• Designing a chocolate bar. This could include the recipe as well as the packaging. Children could use a range of 3D nets to help them decide on the packaging.

• Design and make an Aztec headdress.

• Design and make a papier maché cocoa bean. This could lead to the creation of a storyboard using the cocoa bean made (This ties in with the art unit 'picture this').







Dance/Music

• Using the music from the Mayan section - children could create their own composition in the style of tribal music and then perform a dance to accompany it.

• Using the theme of machinery - children could create their own composition in the style of mechanics/robots and then perform a dance to accompany it.

Science

- Classifying and grouping a range of different materials.
- The life cycle of a cocoa bean.
- Reversible and irreversible changes.

Literacy

- Write a simple story based on the storyboard created in the art lesson.
- Based on designing their own chocolate bar the children could:
 - List the ingredients and write the method for making their bar.
 - Write slogans to accompany the advertising of their bar.
 - Produce simple radio adverts or even make a camcorder version of their advert!
 - Write a persuasive piece to encourage people that their bar is the best.
 - Design and make a poster to advertise their bar.
